J & J TREE DECORATING

The tree theme has been decided at our last meeting and it will be "Tree of Life – Celebrating 50 Years".

Decorations for the tree are needed to be made in both clay and yarn. Any assistance with this would be greatly appreciated. If you could help out with either the pottery or yarn decorations, please contact Jenny Lang via email – <u>alderberan007@gamil.com</u> or a text on 0411431734. This will enable a view of who is doing what etc. Decorations needed are as follows –

Pottery leaves. To be hung on branches/vines. All members are invited

to add their name to a leaf, and/or a positive word/phrase that

describes what pottery means to you. As a time and cost saving measure,

leaves will be fired to stoneware, then painted, and sealed with clear

acrylic rather than using underglaze and glaze.

Pottery '50's to hang on tree. Painted with gold acrylic spray.

Small pottery animals/birds/insects/mushrooms etc to place in the

tree. Anything that would be found in a tree! Ideas welcome! Please note

that there is always a risk of theft with items placed on/in the tree.

We will try to make items as secure as possible.

A sign with our tree name painted on. Tentative plan is to find a

suitable canvas/frame from an op shop and paint with acrylic paints.

Crochet vines to decorate tree trunk and branches.

Small crochet/knit flowers in shades of red, orange, yellow, blue,

purple & pink - patterns to be provided.

Small crochet leaves in shades of green - pattern to be provided.

Both the flower and leaf pattern are very simple and suitable for

beginner crocheters - if you would like to learn, please reach out!

Other yarn decorations - if you have any ideas that fit in the theme

you would like to contribute, please let me know!

Some yarn will be available at the club from Saturday, for anyone who

wishes to crochet or knit items - any further donations of yarn in the above colours would be greatly appreciated.

We are also looking for donations of chicken wire/similar small gauge wire mesh, to create the base for our tree - if you can help out please let me know.

This Saturday morning Jenny Lang will be at the club to start work on the decorations if anyone would like to join her!

SOUP NIGHT

Oh gosh the email sent this week said only 50 sleeps left [a bit less now].

This year the club will not have the assistance of Rotary with the serving of the soup, hence we need our members to step up on the night.

FEATURE – POTTERY CREATOR - Sue Whitton

This month we would like to present to you our very own potter, Sue Whitton.

I was fortunate to catch up with Sue who shared her passion for creativity.

Sue started potting in the early 70's learning hand building techniques and later when Ian McKay came to Stanthorpe he taught Sue how to make lids and teapots, decorating and glaze techniques. Sue was also lucky to have done Ian Curries glaze correspondence course. Sue was President of Stanthorpe Potters for several years and was instrumental in facilitating the club' s extensions and Gallery.

Sue is a life member of the Stanthorpe Club and moved to Warwick in 1995 when purchasing the Red Rooster which meant no pottery for about 20 years. Once the Red Rooster was sold in 2005 Sue once again reverted to pottery which is a good part of her life. Sue taught beginners hand and wheel classes and was instrumental in obtaining a grant for an electric kiln which made life easier for members to fire.

Sue brought her glaze recipes from Stanthorpe and helped members mix and fire pots. Sue enjoys experimenting with new glazes.

During the time that Sue was President, Sue instigated Soup Nights and revamped the gallery.

Sue is only too happy to share her knowledge with anyone who is interested in Pottery as pottery has always been an enormous part of her life.


