MARKET CO ORDINATOR DUTIES

Book Leslie Park with SDRC in advance, generally in July for the following year. Order the bins from Cleanaway and toilets from East Side Hire.

Liaise with web designer to update online application and information sheets at least 3mths ahead of the market. Ensure the dates and times are correct on all info sheets.

Send bulk email to previous years stallholders to advise that applications are now open. A Database is held with all previous stallholders email addresses.

Whilst the applications are open online, check markets emails regularly for queries from stallholders. Applications need to be checked for valid insurance, food licences and payment of site fee.

Produce the stallholders site map! The site map needs to be completed 2 weeks before the market and emailed out to all stallholders.

Once the site map is done, arrange a meeting with Parks and Gardens showing layout and what and where power is required. There is limited power outlets at the park. Work with Jumpers and Jazz as they have use of a section of the park for their live music on the day.

Liaise with Yangan Freemasons for the marking out of the sites at the park and duties required for the markets day.

FEATURE PIECE by Tegan and Miranda

Pottery abroad

Hello! My name is Tegan and I am a new potter at the club. My wife Miranda and I have been members of Warwick Potters for about a year. This is a short story about our trip to a couple of the international homes of ancient and modern pottery...

On a recent visit to the United Kingdom, we found ourselves planning a route between the lovely city of Bath and the beautiful Lakes district. We were on the hunt for a nice spot to stretch our legs and have a bite to eat. As luck would have it, we found that Stoke-on-Trent was just a small deviation of the motorway.

This name may ring some bells for some potters, especially with the town's resurgence in popularity thanks to the UK series, *The Great Pottery Throw Down*.

Stoke-on-Trent, also known as "The Potteries", has a rich history of pottery production that dates back to the 17th century. The industry began with a small group of farmer-potters. The area's abundance of clay and coal led to the rapid growth of the industry. With innovators such as Josiah Spode (said to be the inventor of blue underglaze transfer printing) and Josiah Wedgewood (associated with the "dry-bodied" stoneware *Jasperware*), driving the industry forward, the area became a thriving factory-based town that supplied pottery to the world.

While the clean air act of 1956 led to a decline in the ceramics industry, Stoke-on-Trent is still famous for its quality tableware, tiles, and sanitary ware. Some leading brands in the area include: Wedgwood, Moorcroft, Aynsley, Burleigh, Dudson, Emma Bridgewater, Portmeirion, Royal Doulton, and Royal Stafford.

The ceramics gallery is home to over 5,000 pieces that explain the history of manufacture and design in the pottery industry. The vast collection is also home to more eclectic assortments, such as the Keiller collection of 667 cow creamer jugs (some pictured) and the Marjorie Davies collection of nearly 300 frog mugs!


To say we were impressed by what we learnt and saw would be an understatement. From the early version of the pottery wheel (pictured) which was a two-person operation, through to an incredible hand-built peacock from 1870s (pictured), we were in awe of the skill of those from times gone by.

Once finished in the gallery, we made our way back to the lower floors which are home to the Anglo-Saxon Kingdom of Mercia collection, Natural Science, and Local History. The Potteries Museum and Art Gallery is a great place to see the history of Stoke and with free entry, it makes for a bargain morning out with nice tea, sandwiches and cake on offer too (not pictured but very much enjoyed).

Towards the end of our holiday, we experienced a second moment of absolute pottery awe on the little Greek island of Aegina. While we were pretty impressed with the pottery prowess of the modern world, the ancient pots and pottery at the local archaeological museum demonstrated just how long this artform has existed. Included in the wonders of this ancient place (artefacts aged between 3000-500BC), was a fired pot bigger than Miranda! (pictured). This pot is around five thousand years old (built around 3000-2500BC), and we struggled to comprehend how ancient potters could build and fire such amazing artefacts so long ago.

During our adventure to the United Kingdom and across Europe, we gained a new appreciation for this art form and a new admiration for every person who ever has and ever will embrace this craft.


